WE MUST GET TOGETHER SOME TIME

The eleven-member multi-disciplinary artist collective We Must Get Together Some Time will exhibit a major body of new works in a self-titled multi-venue exhibition in Mandurah (CASM and ManPAC) as part of the Indian Ocean Craft Triennial (IOTA21) from 17 October to 14 November and will lead associated workshops and cultural events from July to mid-November.

We Must Get Together Some Time (WMGTST) practices slow-making, through active and passionate long-term creative engagements with non-urban places and non-human worlds. WMGTST use skilful practices and materials including textiles, natural materials, found objects, ceramics, video and creative writing to bring into being finely crafted works.

Artworks, stories of their making, and community workshops will open conversations with audiences and invite responses to questions and concerns about the Australian bush, rural communities and the natural and cultural materiality of place in these precarious times.

THE ARTISTS

HELEN COLEMAN

Coleman describes herself as a contemporary colourwoman, with an art practice devoted to process and experimentation rather than production of artworks. Tapping into a thirty-year career in botany and chemistry, Coleman explores the artistic potential of local plant, animal and earth materials. By blending ancient and contemporary techniques, these diverse samples are transformed into unique pigments, inks and paints.

A studio visit reveals drawers full of ink swatches, rows of labelled pigment jars and a rainbow of lake pigments spread out to dry. Dye pots simmer outside with contents ranging from cow bones to wattle galls; a large granite mortar is in constant use grinding cuttlefish. Coleman shares her research through workshops, teaching artists and the broader community about simple pigment extraction techniques and the preparation of art mediums using local, natural materials.

JANE DONLIN

Jane Donlin is a slow-maker inspired by stitching, spinning, weaving, dyeing and concerned with questions of sustainability in the Anthropocene. Her work is intrinsically linked to walking, collecting, reading, contemplating. Play and experimentation with thread, fibre and collected materials are central to her work as are supporting relationships between other makers.

Jane has shown her work in numerous art exhibitions, including at remix in 2011 at the Art Gallery of Western Australia. In 2016, she co-created the stitched work of The State of WA's Coat of Arms, Supreme Court's Ceremonial Court, David Malcolm Justice Centre, Perth.

SHARYN EGAN

Sharyn Egan is a Nyoongar woman who began creating art at the age of 37, in 2001 she was awarded a BA (Arts) from Curtin University. Sharyn's work is informed by the experiences of her life as a Nyoongar woman and the balga.

Sharyn works in a variety of mediums including painting, sculpture and woven forms using traditional and contemporary fibres. Her woven works include traditionally styled contemporary forms and baskets, as well as sculptural forms often based on flora and fauna that has totemic significance for the Nyoongar people.

TODD ISRAEL

Todd Israel has been a committed maker of fine crafted fibre works for 20 years. He has a BA from ECU and a Grad Dip in Teaching art and is currently the specialist art teacher at Moorditj Noongar Community College in Midland.

This elite athlete focuses on the body and its various sections, he is intrigued by the relationship between the moving limb in reality and how it can be expressed in fibre. He makes life size male figures in stages of movement including a male figure with WA wildflowers worked into it with grasses showing the heart and various plants surrounding it.

GEORGE KARPATHAKIS

George Karpathakis PhD is an experienced filmmaker and adjunct academic who works in a variety of screen production genres, including drama, experimental and documentary. As a television producer George produced the art education series Landscape and You (1996) and films featuring field-working artists Else King-Fragile Objects (1998), Nalda Searles-A Stitching of Words (2008), and Greg Pryor-Yilgarn Lacunae (2019).

George is currently filming the WMGTST project. He also works with found objects gathered over many years walking the city streets—his landscape—to produce small sculptural assemblages and photographic prints of the ephemeral works.

ANNETTE NYKIEL

Slow-maker and artist-researcher, Annette Nykiel PhD, wonders about the interdependence of ecological systems including her own in local heathlands, wetlands and woodlands. She makes do with gathered natural materials and cloth with a history to relate to the materiality of non-urban spaces while wandering amongst urban, regional and remote areas as a geoscientist, artsworker and fibre/textile artist.

For many years, she has exhibited in different spaces in urban and regional Australia and internationally. Her solo show, meeting place, was awarded the FRINGEWORLD Visual Art Award, 2018.

PERDITA PHILLIPS

The work of Dr Perdita Phillips asks us to listen to and work with the places and more-than-human worlds around us. Creating 'anticipatory aesthetics' to widen the potentials in a narrowing world, she exhibits widely including Listening in the Anthropocene (2020, Charles Sturt University), Invisible monsters: A tour of Perth's underground pollution (Perth 2018), Make Known: The Exquisite Order of Infinite Variation (2018, UNSW Galleries), Here&Now2018 (Lawrence Wilson Art Gallery).

Perdy runs workshops on walking, sound recording and listening to places, and cyanotype and anthotype alternative photographic processes. Recent work includes the sound listenings. She is currently working on Follow the Water; a multimedia field project about drains and water in Albany.

DR NIEN SCHWARZ

Dr Nien Schwarz taught sculpture at ECU for 18 years. Geoscience and interdisciplinary interests inform the making of artworks that prompt consideration of living more sustainably. Key exhibitions: In Situ Holmes a Court Gallery (2021), Earth Matters Turner Galleries (2008), Over my shoulder PICA (2006), Beyond Familiar Territory Perth Arts Festival (2001).

A penchant for Earth sciences draws her to remote regions. Her installations and objects include earth samples and are intended to provoke consideration of human relationships to the ground, particularly mining, agriculture and urban encroachment. She has posed the same question for three decades: "Why are we not building more respectful relationships with Earth by living more sustainably?"

MICHELLE SLARKE

Michelle Slarke is a visual artist and writer based in Lake Grace, WA. Michelle's work is research-based and often informed by the social and historic content of place so as to create layered meaning and perspectives. She uses materials intrinsic to a site or concept and diverse, non-traditional methods.

Her practice is interdisciplinary, including installation, mixed media, environmental works and permanent public artworks. Text is an important component, including a cross-over to writing works of non-fiction and fiction. Michelle has exhibited nationally and internationally and created collaborative works through cultural exchange.

DIANNE STRAHAN

Dianne Strahan's walks collecting fallen plant matter leave her with a serenity found in no other way. Botanical printing, particularly in book form, is a way for her to archive the plants found in a specific area on a specific day. It also becomes a visual diary of her journey throughout the State. Opening each book and following the embossed shapes of the leaves across the page, inhaling the aroma left by the oils from the plant and admiring the colours on the paper or fabric all take her back to a particular place or time.

Diane currently has work in East End Gallery, Beverly and Potions Gallery, Narrogin and is working towards her first solo exhibition at NEXIS gallery in Narrogin.

NANDI CHINNA

Nandi Chinna is an award-winning poet. She facilitates workshops on the art of Poepatetics—the practice of walking and writing in order to connect with the natural world and foster creative responses to nature.

Her latest poetry book, The Future Keepers (Fremantle Press 2019) was shortlisted for the 2020 Prime Ministers Literary Award, and Highly Commended for the Victorian Premiers Prize 2020.

What do you hear when you walk in a local wetland? Have you ever thought of what the sounds around you can tell you about where you live? Unlike seeing, sound is all around us, all of the time. We will make an on-the-spot sun print as a record of where we had walked and what materials we find: creating a 'map' or 'blueprints' of our walk.
